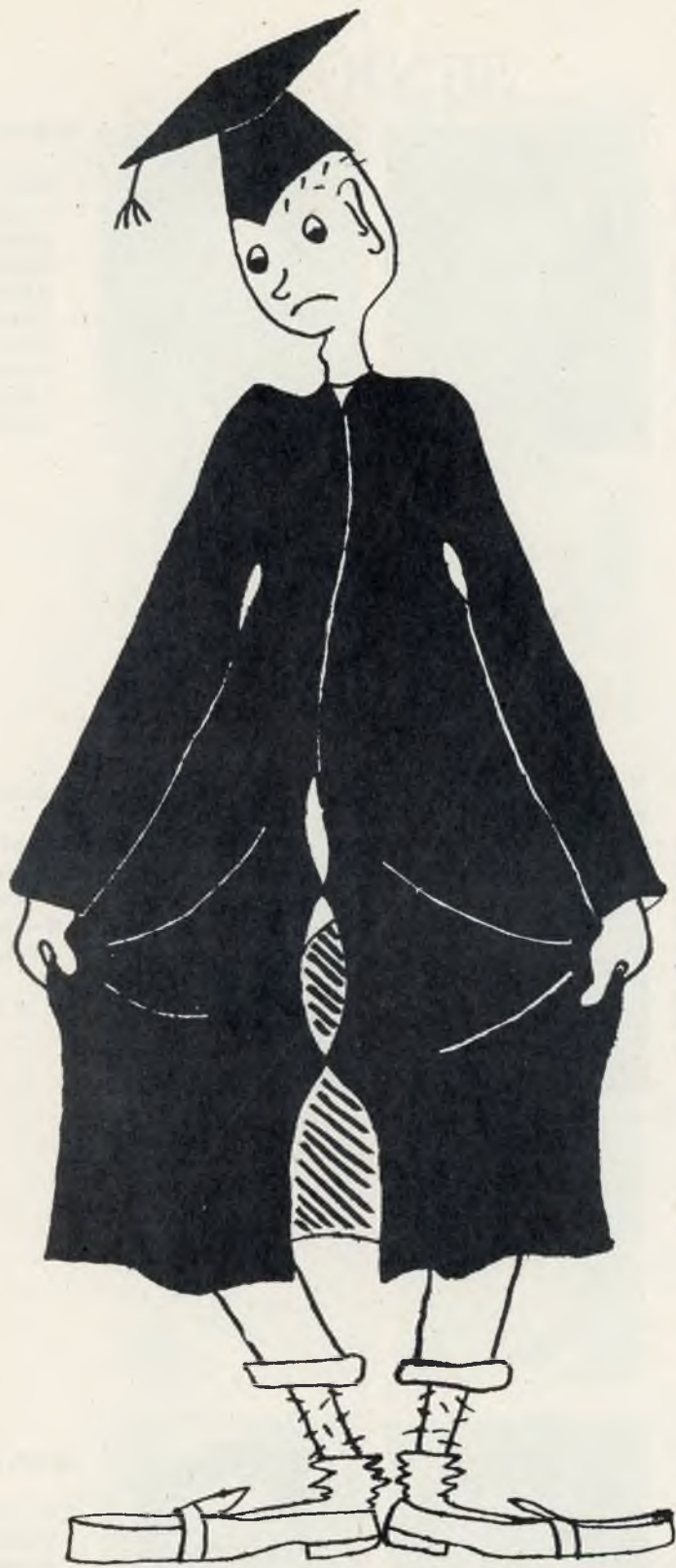

LOG OF THE GOOD SHIP "47"

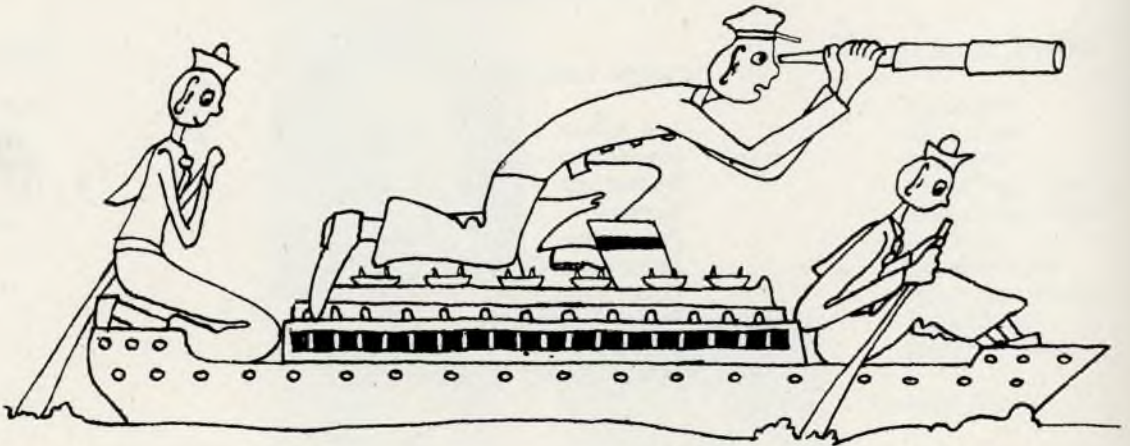

All through the voyage, we were busy preparing for the eventful trip through Graduation Strait; cards and announcements, measurements for full dress uniforms, preparation for class night and finally emergence from Graduation Strait into the Bay.

As we leave the Bay and set sail upon the vast Sea of Life, we want to bid farewell to our shipmates and wish them swift and happy sailing in the remaining years of their lives aboard ship. May you have many successful years guiding the seamen in the ship of school toward a robust and successful voyage on the Sea of Life.

In spite of several defeats the team tried their best to win and should be given credit for having played often against great odds.

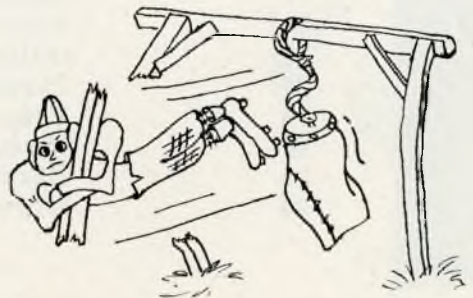
This year N.H.S. played night football for the first time. The Northville Farmington game opened the first of many contests on the Henry Ford Field.

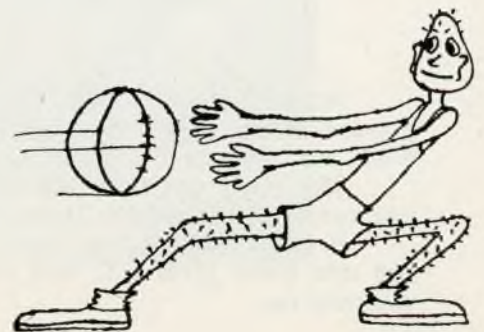

The present squad, who next year will be freshmen should provide a good foundation for the second team, giving us winners on both ends of our 47-48 basketball programs.

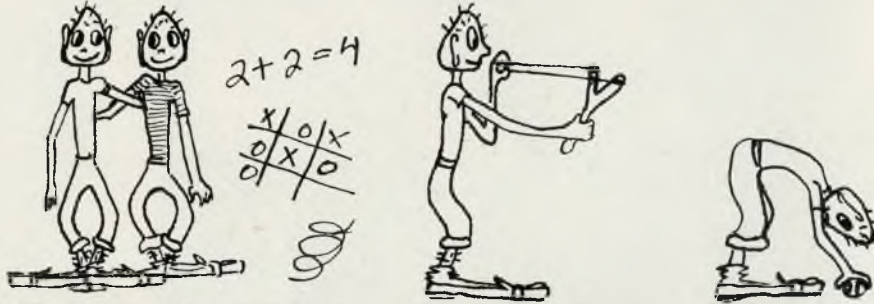

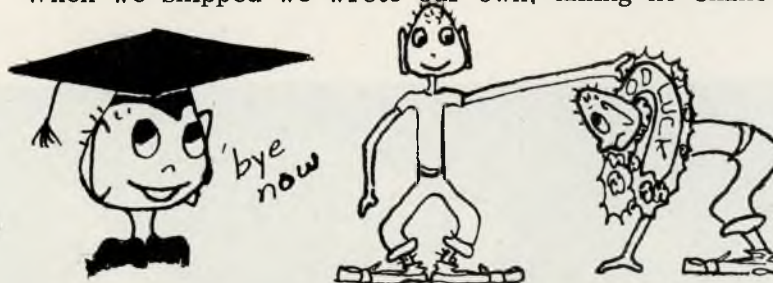
