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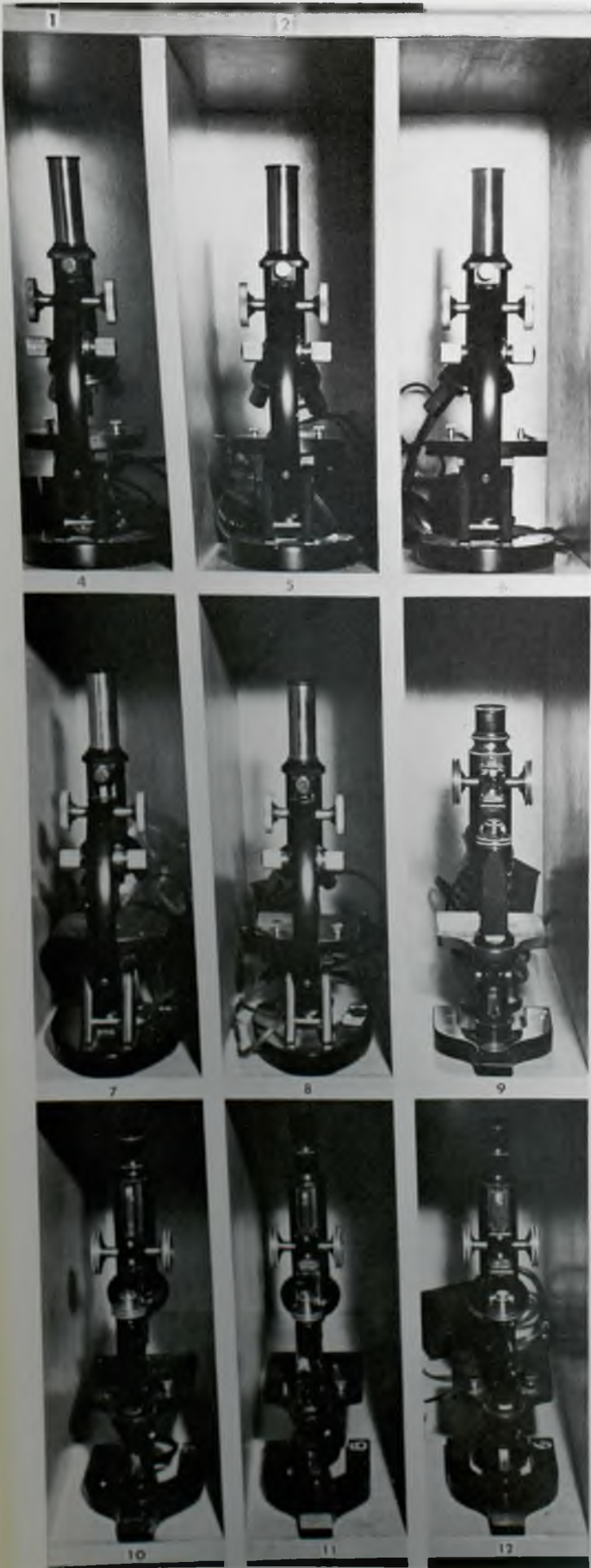

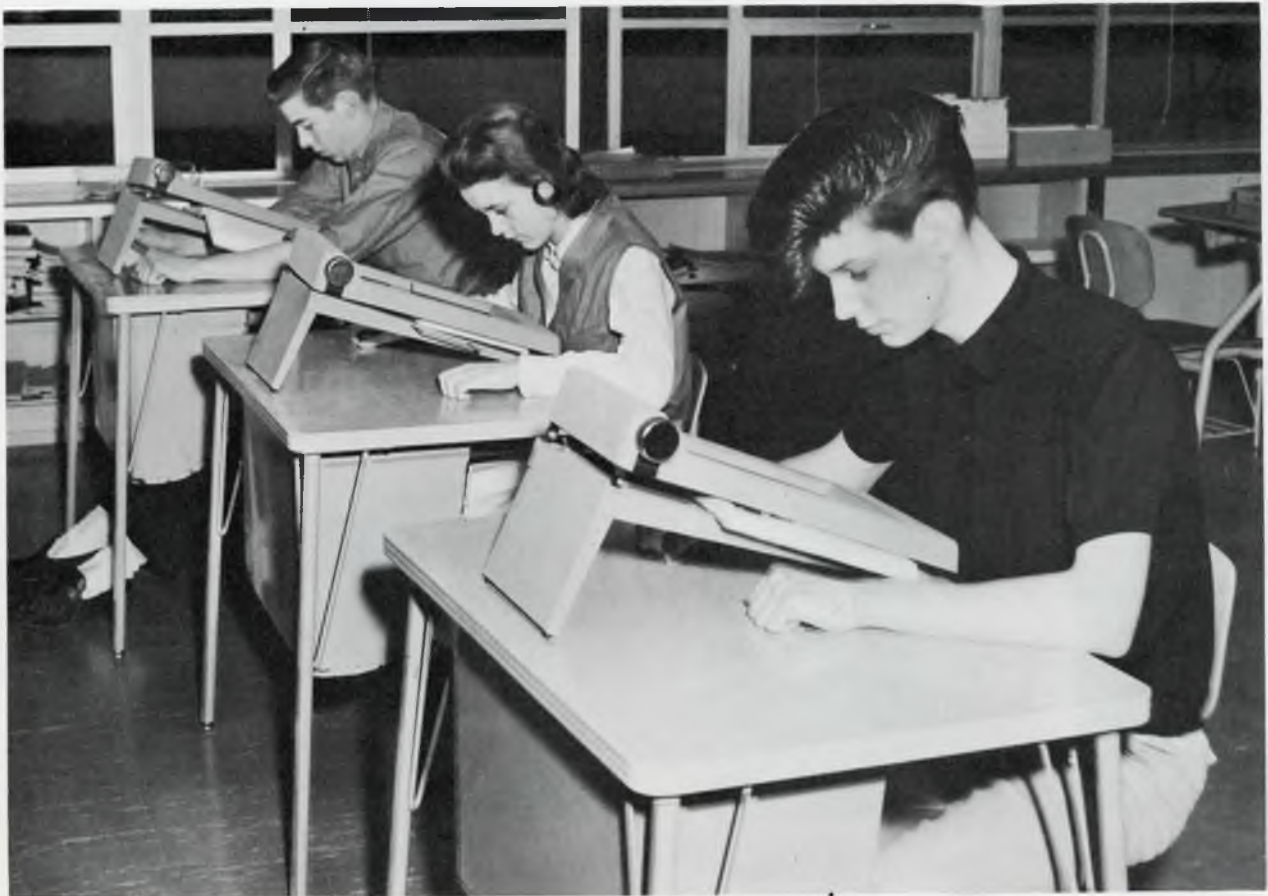

The Class of 1963 Remembers - - - -

Amid all the excitement of being the first freshman class to enter our new building, we quickly found it necessary to settle down and adjust to our surroundings. We eagerly elected as our officers: Tom Swiss, Craig Bell, Vicki Boyd and Dikran Ornekian, and as sponsors Miss Dingman and Mr. Rusche. Our first attempt at sponsoring a dance resulted in "Shangri La".

In 1960 we returned to our now familiar high school as Sophomores. We immediately chose Frank Steinberger as President, Chris Gazlay Vice President, Vicki Boyd as Secretary and Jeff Crawford Treasurer. Sharon Soubliere was our representative on The Homecoming Queen's Court. Under the guidance of our advisers Mrs. Stillson and Mr. Rusche we sponsored a "Holly Hop" and selected our class rings, which we looked forward to receiving in the fall.

The autumn of 1961 found us as juniors strutting through the halls with hands extended, displaying our new symbols of approaching seniordom. We soon stifled our pride and settled down to making our magazine sale a success. Our officers: Jim Juday, Craig Bell, Etta Ruttan and Jeff Crawford, along with many other ambitious Juniors, soon found themselves busily preparing for the J Hop, with its Hawaiian theme "Hale Kahi" and the music of Bob Durant's orchestra. Our girl on the Queen's Court at Homecoming was Nancy Hansor, and our Sponsors, Chosen for both our junior and senior years, were Mr. Kraus and Mr. Mack. The spring found us hard at work on the Junior-Senior Banquet, which closed our busy year in anticipation of our own finale which was to begin in September.

Seniors at long last! We started off full of eagerness, with a few vices, a few virtues, and began our final stab at earning the marks that would be acceptable to some college or employer in September of 1963. Our officers for the last stanza were Duna Penn, Mike Lang, Karen Peterson and Jeff Crawford. We sponsored a dance called "Moments to Remember", which describes our whole senior year. Then came the opening of our new track and football field, on which our own Queen Karen was the first of many Homecoming Queens to officiate. Etta and Brenda were Princesses, and our eager captains of the football team enjoyed taking full advantage of the occasion. We really began to feel like seniors when we had our photographs taken and when they came back and were traded amid general confusion and warm fellyings. After being measured for our caps and gowns, we ordered announcements and name cards. Still later we began receiving replies to our job and college applications, and finally, finally! came the events we had looked forward to and worked for - Skip Day, The Prom, Baccalaureate and Commencement.

For the first time, the induction of new members into the NATIONAL HONOR SOCIETY was held during school hours as an assembly program.



Dr. MacLeod, Mr. Quay and the four officers of the Honor Society each gave a talk to welcome the new members. Each officer lit a candle, signifying the four aims: Leadership, Service, Scholarship and Character.



The National Honor Society consists of the top students in grades ten through twelve. To become eligible for membership one must have at least a "B" average, and display merits in character, leadership, and service to the school.

The Student Council sponsors many services and promotes citizenship.



The Northville Student Council, which enjoyed another busy year, is a representative government; the members are selected by their homerooms, and alternates are chosen to replace absent aldermen. The officers this year were: President Frank Steinberger, Secretary Brenda Coburn, Treasurer David Jerome. The council sponsored a college debate between Notre Dame and Illinois Normal. Another service was to publish the annual handbook, of which more than two hundred copies were sold. Our student council was the only one in our league known to operate a student court, which attempts to remind students of

their responsibilities as good citizens in and out of school.

Most of the council's funds were gained from the refreshment stands, operated after school each day and during football and basketball games. The council conducted several fund-raising drives for charity: CARE campaign; Peanuts for Polio; a March of Dimes Dance; clothing for indigent children; and an Easter Seal campaign. Finally, it offered a one hundred dollar grant-in-aid to a graduating senior planning to attend college.



The Choir

The Choir, under the direction of Mr. Lee, presented many successful concerts this year. During the Christmas season they sang at the Methodist

Club, Maybury Sanatorium and the Rotary Club. They also participated in the chapel services at Thanksgiving, Christmas and Easter.



In the spring the Choir presented the operetta, "Patience" by Gilbert and Sullivan. Several members of the choir from N.H.S. were chosen to represent

the school in the All League Choir. At the time of graduation the choir sang at the Baccalaureate.



Concert Band



During the football season, the concert band, led by Mr. Lee and Mr. Williams, changed into a marching band, which took part in pre-game and half-time activities.

The versatile group also played on Mayor's Day, on Memorial Day, at the State Fair, at a Band Festival, and at the State Hospital.

Dr. Ralph Long, of Albion College, directed at the December concert--one of three performed during the school year.

At pep assemblies, the band helped the students cheer the team to victories over many league schools.

Throughout the summer, the band will spark Monday evenings with concerts under the stars at the Northville City Hall Park.



Dance Band

The members of the Dance Band who also belong to the Concert Band, practiced on Fridays and played at the Homecoming Dance. The Junior High School also appreciated an assembly. In the fall they enjoyed a delicious dinner at the Statler-Hilton Hotel, and afterward played jazz for the guests.

Mr. Harold Schmidt gave the Dance Band a pleasant surprise: a generous donation toward their new blazers.

The group had many honors, including playing at many All League Band Concerts; giving a clinic for the band directors of South-Eastern Michigan; and playing at another clinic, sponsored by the Conn Company.

All these activities, "Keep alive one of the truly American art forms," says Mr. Robert Williams, the Dance Band's sponsor.

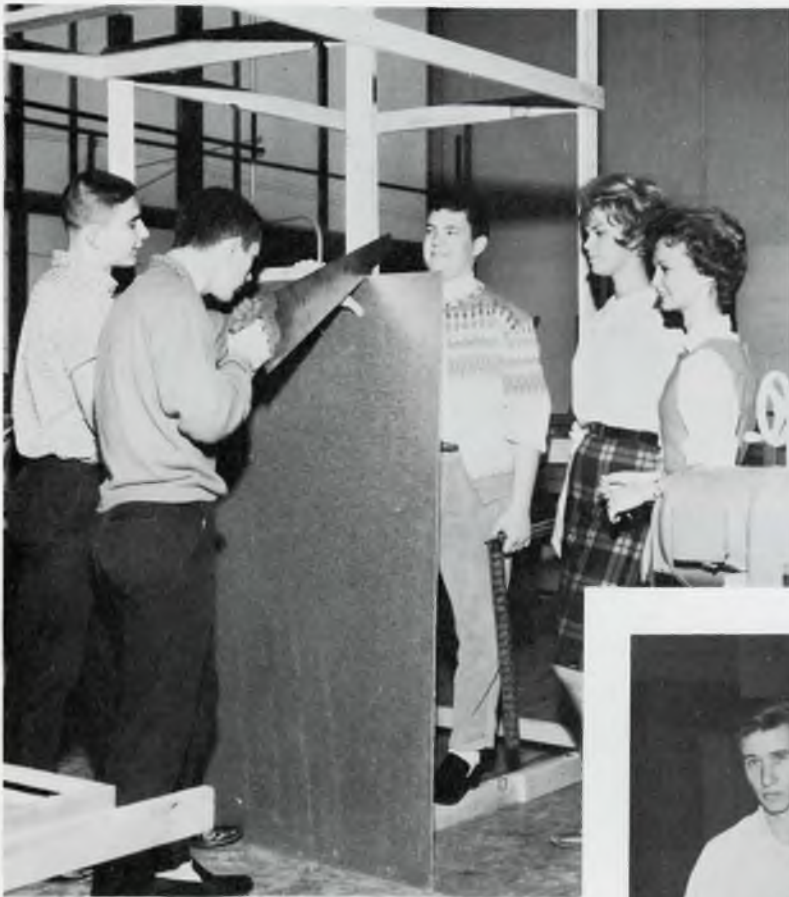

The Mustangs came through our league season as undefeated Champions, and advanced to the Semi-finals of the State Tournament, defeating Grand Rapids Central and finally losing to Royal Oak Kimball.

This year the (FORENSIC CLUB), one of the largest and most active in school, began with much hard work in preparation for the production of the all-school play, "My Sister Eileen." The officers, Dave Lane, Jim Drew, Bobbie Davis, and Chuck Sommers planned a Christmas party at which the members enjoyed Mr. Stafford's slides of the play, and a visit from Santa. A children's play was substituted for the one-acts this year and the many members who were involved found this very rewarding. As usual, the year was climaxed by the annual club banquet.



"The (THESPIAN CLUB) is a spark plug for dramatics at N.H.S.," says Miss Panattoni.

Students are eligible for the honor of membership when they earn a specific number of points. These points are given for participating in plays, speeches, and other dramatic activities. (The point system was devised by the National Thespians Association.)

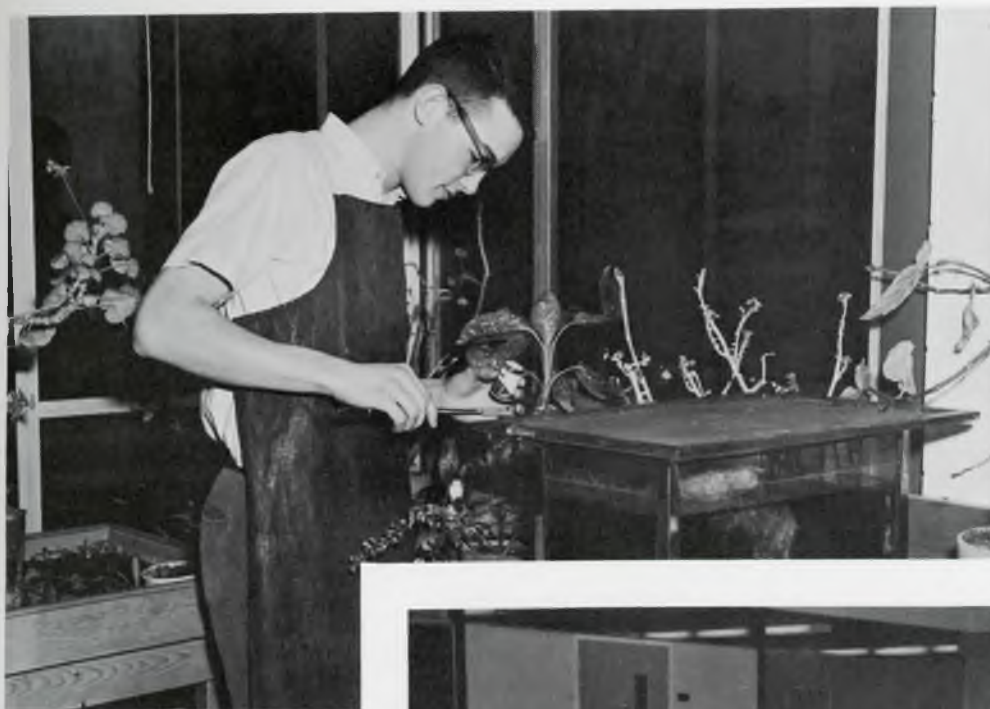
How do you keep lumps out of white sauce? Some homemaking students find that it is quite a trick. As one of their requirements each kitchen group prepared several lunches.

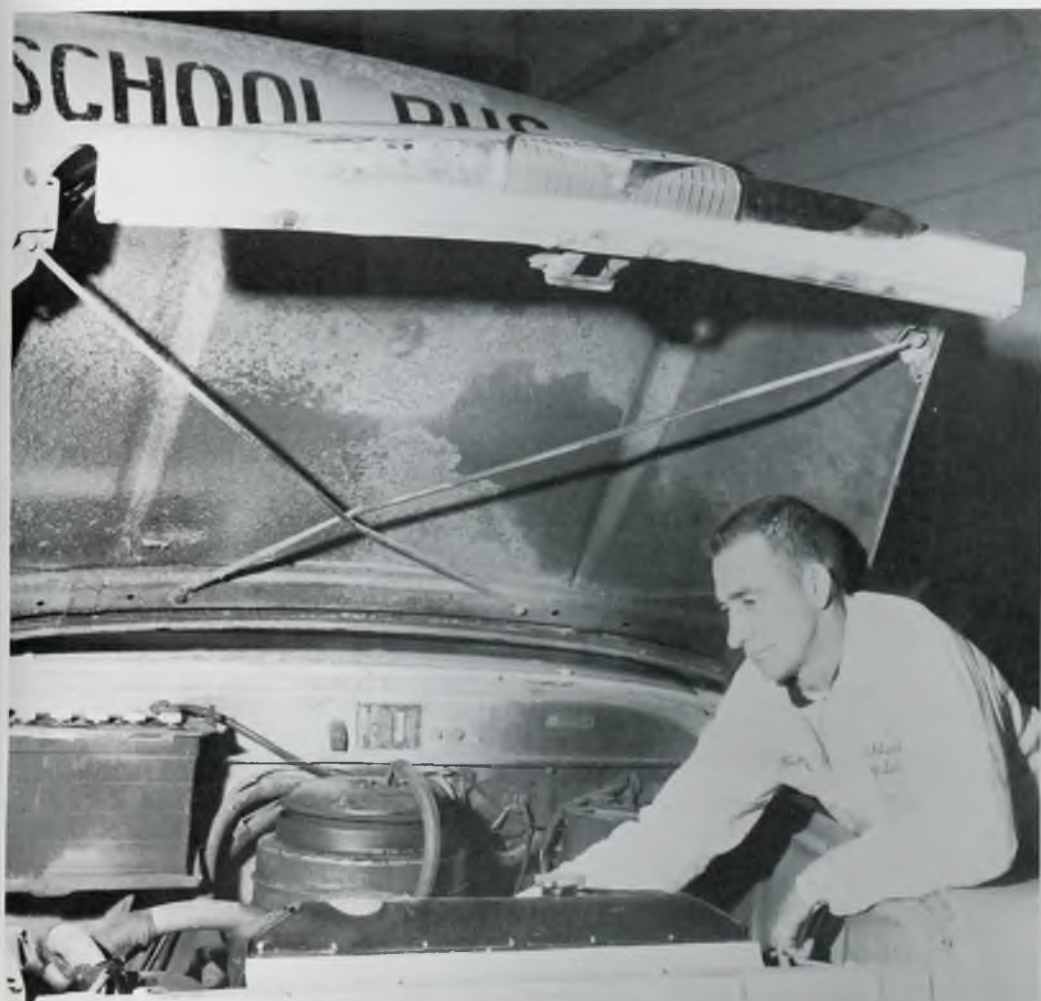
