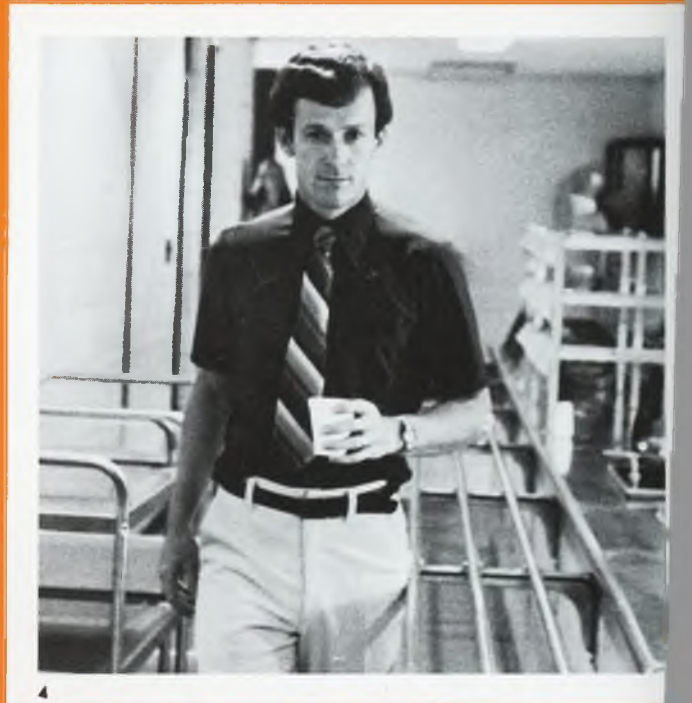
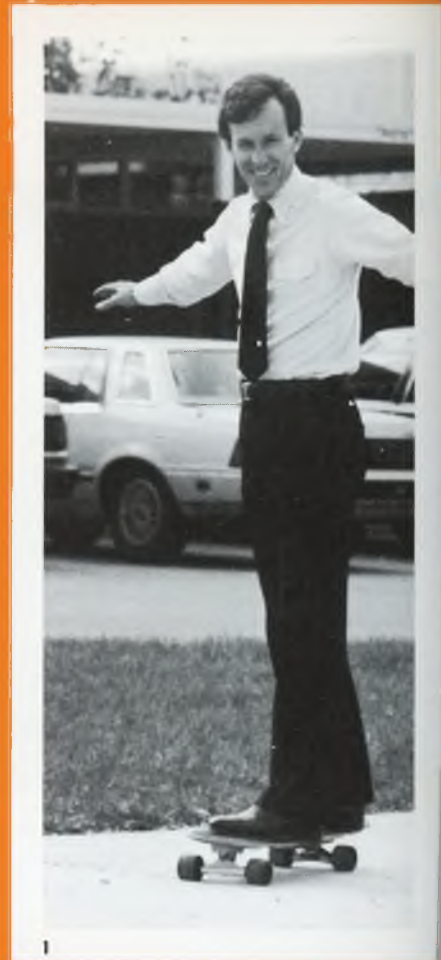

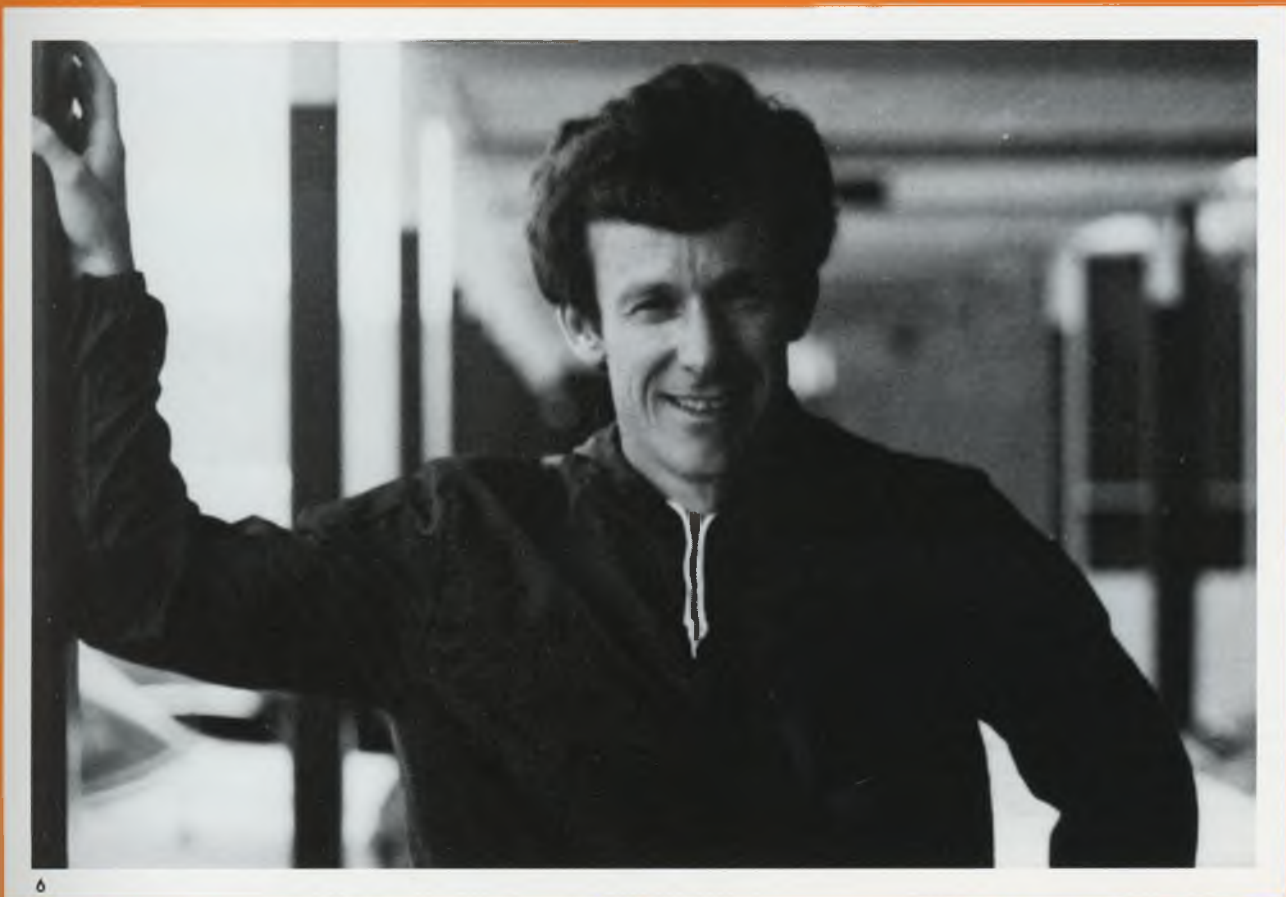

A Christmas Carol

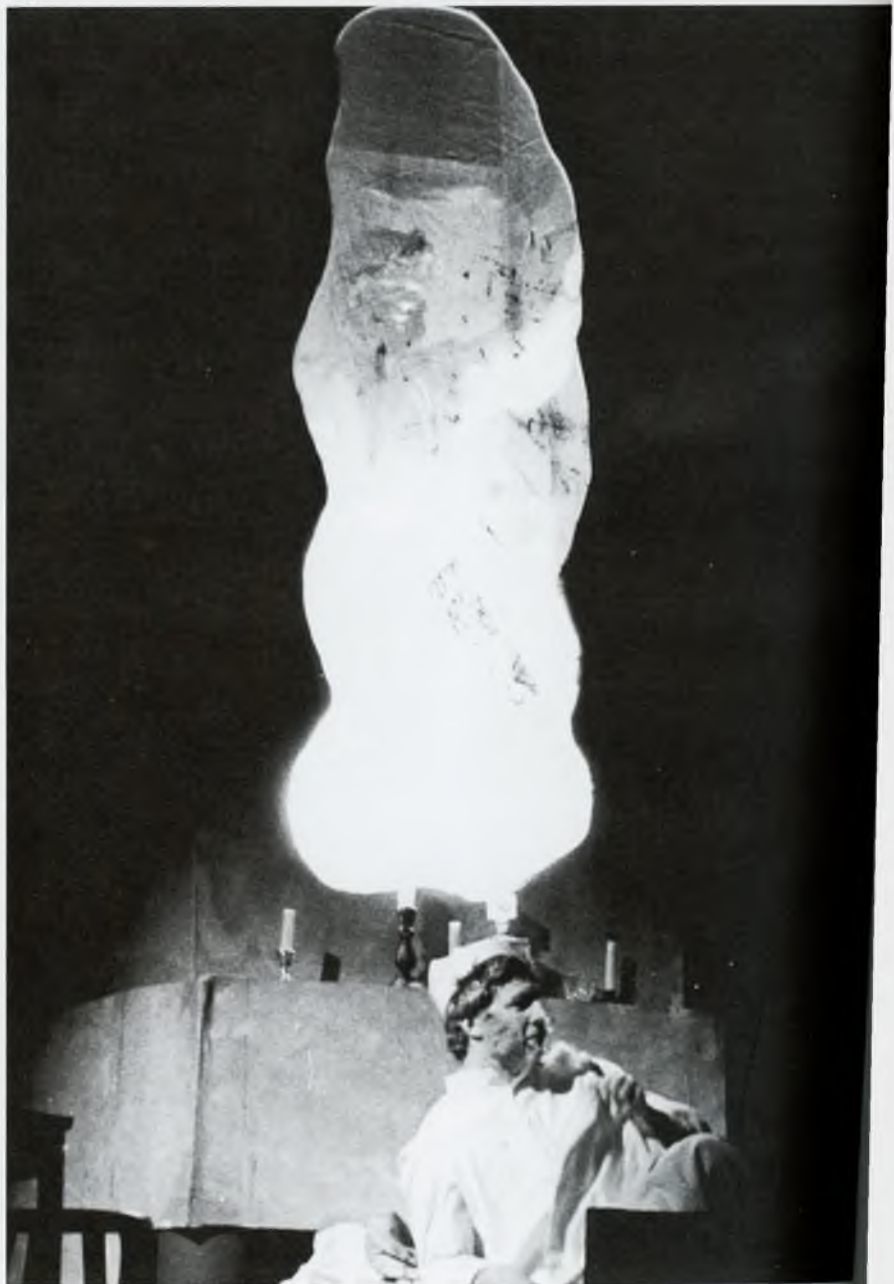

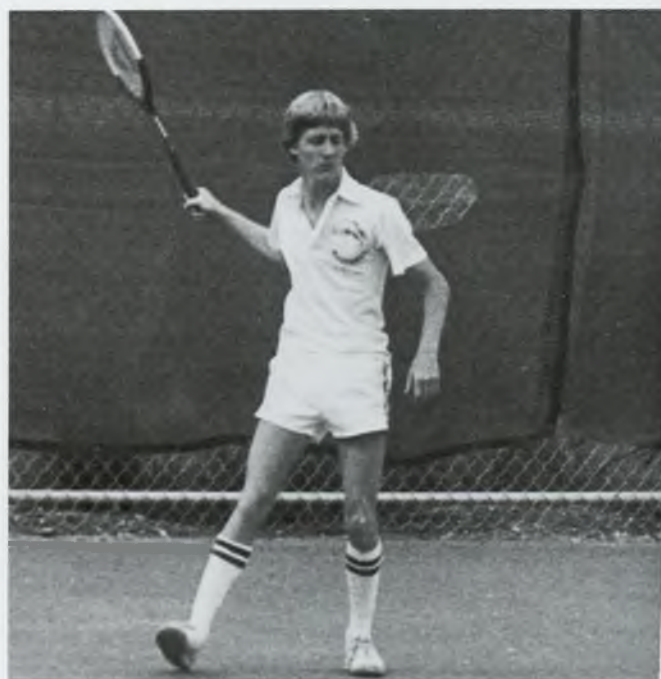

Varsity Football

Nineteen eighty-three proved to be one of the most exciting football seasons in recent years. The Western Lakes League was labeled as one of the top conferences in the State of Michigan. The season started out on a high note as the Mustangs dominated Redford Thurston 47-0. Westland John Glenn came to Northville for the home opener and Todd Deal scored a touchdown with 13 seconds left, for a dramatic come-from-behind 14-0 victory.

The 1982 State Champion Farmington Harrison came next. They were in the process of setting the State Class A consecutive victory record at the expense of Northville. The crowd was the largest in recent years to watch a Mustang game, with cameras from all three major television stations in Detroit. Except for a blocked punt in the initial drive of the game, the first three quarters were even. Harrison went into the fourth quarter with a 6-0 lead. Late in the game they converted two turnovers into touchdowns, and left with a 20-0 victory.

The Varsity Mustangs went on to finish in second place in the Western Division behind Harrison, and completed a 6-3 season. An exciting highlight later in the year was a 46-7 homecoming victory over W.L. Western, in which Steve Smith scored four touchdowns and John Quinn once again rushed for over 100 yards.

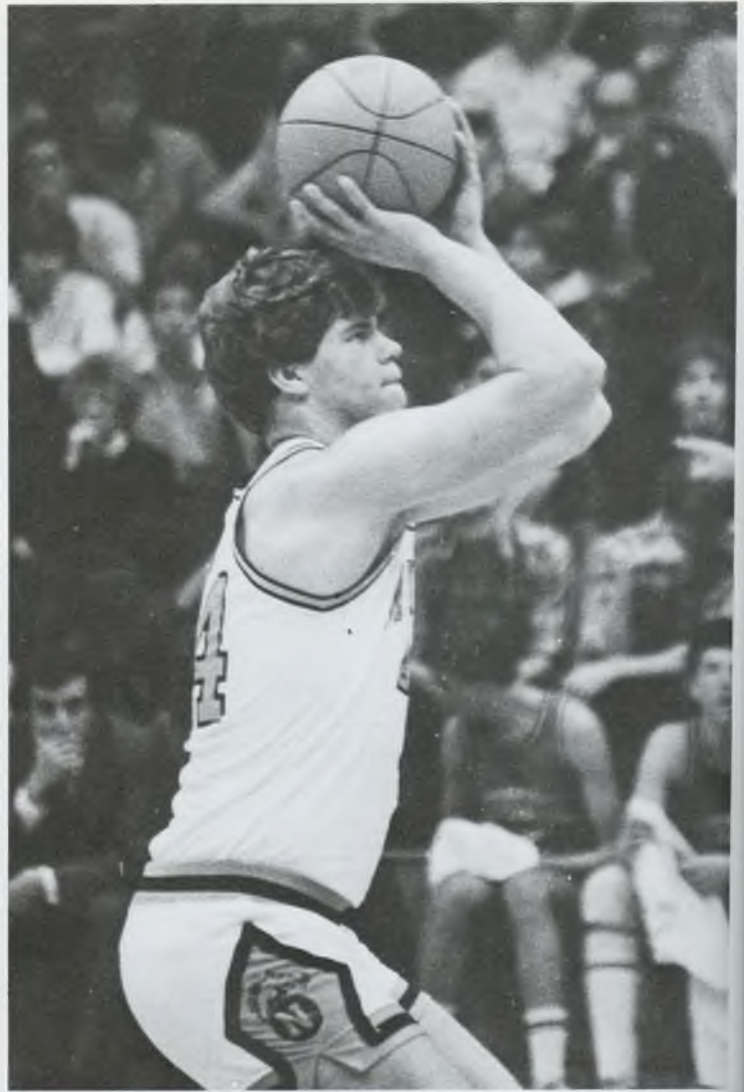

The team won the conference trophy for playing an excellent year of tennis.

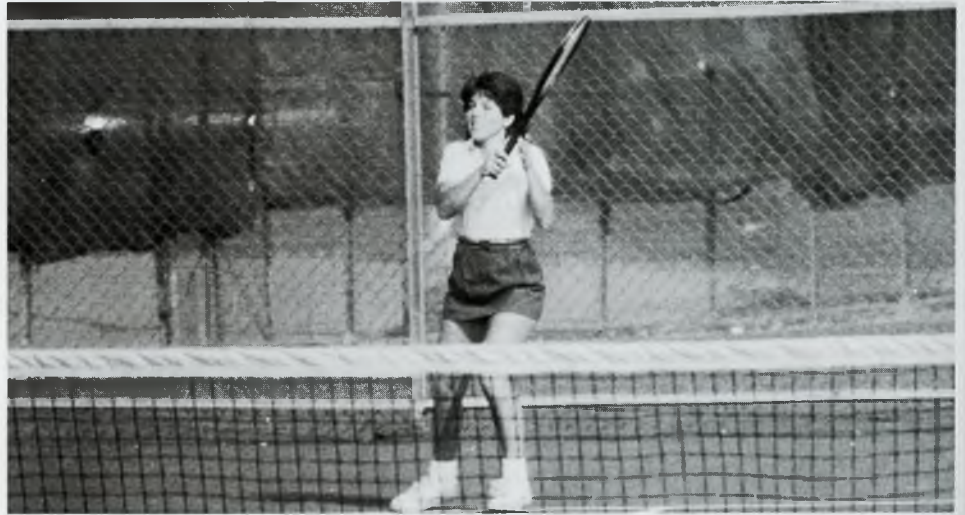

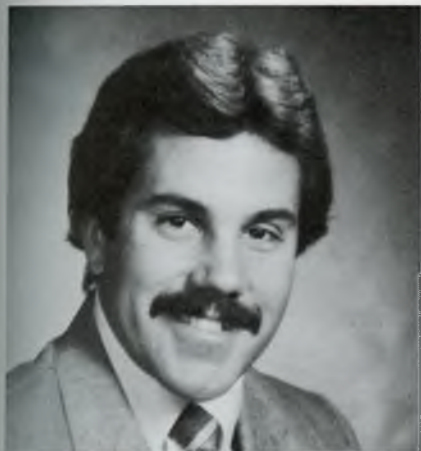
Foreign Languages

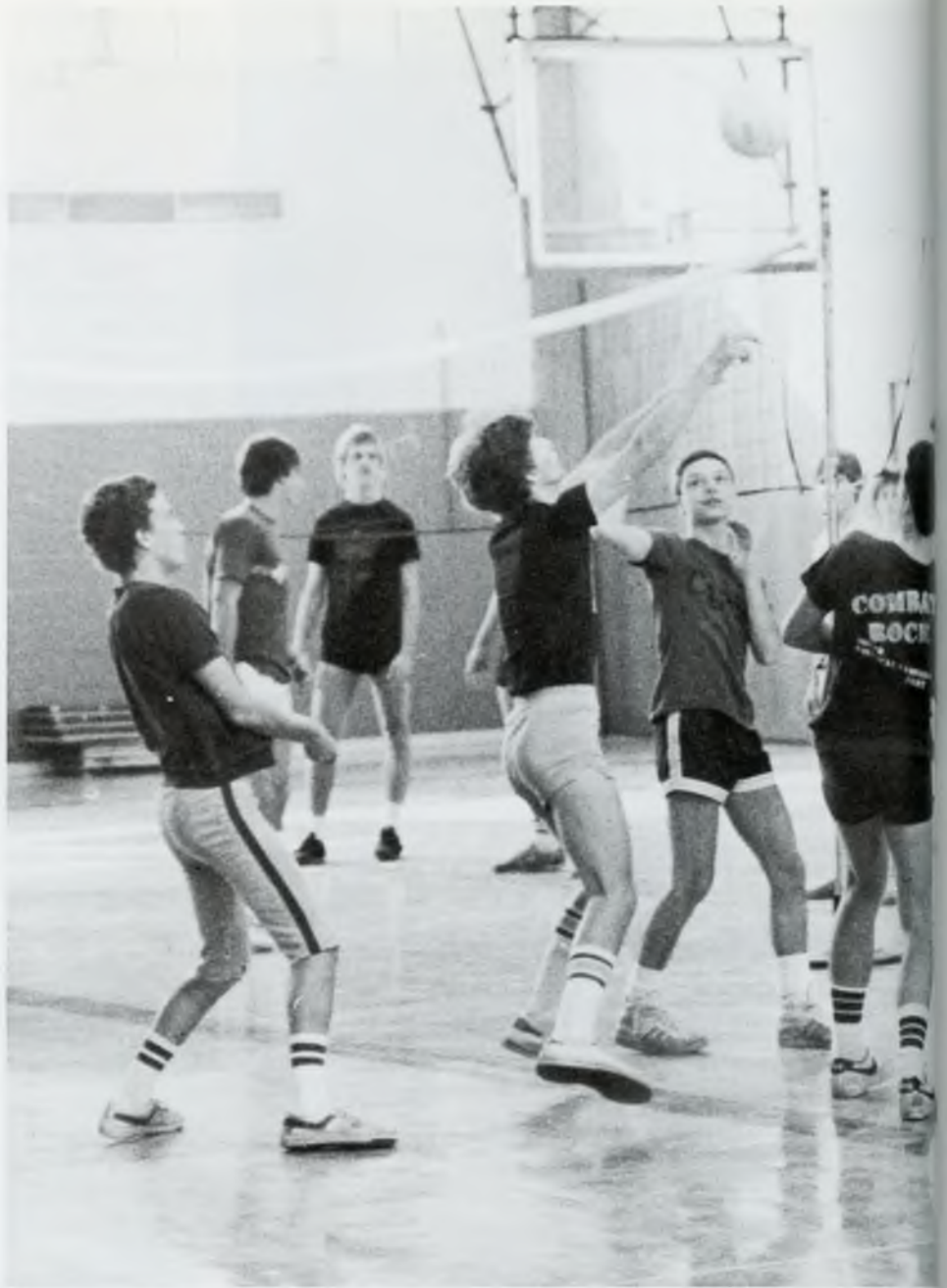
Phys. Ed.

In the News . . .

Nineteen eighty-three was a year marked by international strife. Lebanon continued to serve as a battleground for Israel, Syria, and the P.L.O. while a multinational peacekeeping force made up of U.S., French, and Italian troops attempted to keep Lebanon in one piece.

The event hitting closest to home was the terrorist attack on the U.S. Marine command post in Beirut, Lebanon. The October 23 attack was carried out by an unidentified terrorist driving a dynamite laden vehicle through barricades and into the building. It killed 240 Marines and wounded 81, the highest number of American casualties in a single day since the start of the Tet Offensive, January 13, 1968, when 246 American servicemen were killed throughout Vietnam.

Portions of the P.L.O. loyal to Yasser Arafat were unsuccessful in fighting off the Syrian faction of the P.L.O. in Tripoli and eventually were forced to make a United Nations aided escape.

The U.S. Marines were not the only party to suffer casualties in Lebanon. Similar attacks took place at the U.S. embassy and headquarters of the French Paratroopers.

The U.S.S.R. shot down Korean Air Lines flight 007 while it was experiencing navigational difficulties over Soviet airspace. This barbaric act caused grief and outrage the world over. All passengers and crew aboard flight 007 perished.

Fearing an Iran-like hostage situation and lack of enthusiasm for a Soviet and Cuban controlled airstrip caused the decision to invade Grenada at the request of the Organization of Caribbean States. Quickly freeing medical students and restoring order to this small island, this operation was carried out primarily by U.S. Army Rangers.

In addition to the preceding events, Afghan rebels continued their fight against Soviet aggression. Iran and Iraq fought their on-going war, and a new hot-spot erupted between Chad and Libya. Europeans protested the deployment of new Perching II and additional cruise missiles at bases throughout Europe. However, by year's end, missiles had been deployed in Great Britain and West Germany.

As in almost every year, Mother Nature earned her share of headlines. Always fickle California weather blew tornadoes through the Los Angeles area heavily damag-

ing a square-mile area. The continued erosion of the coastline south of San Francisco caused evacuation of people residing near the coast in Pacific. The worst natural disaster was the earthquake in Narman, Turkey which killed over 500. Record low temperatures across North America made for chilly Christmas holidays and threatened citrus crops and beef cattle herds.

Not all the news of 1983 was bad. The improved economy bolstered people's confidence in spending and spurred record setting retail sales. New models such as the Ford Thunderbird and Dodge Daytona led the way to the American auto industry's comeback. A joint venture by General Motors and Toyota, the number one and three auto producers in the world, has caused an uproar within the industry but apparently will proceed as scheduled.

Astronauts Sally K. Ride and Guy Bluford made space history. Ride was the first American woman to go into space. She was aboard the space shuttle's 7th mission. Bluford, the first black in space was aboard the shuttle's 8th mission.

Two Korean children were certainly thankful for President and Mrs. Reagan's Far East tour. Lee Kil Woo, 4, and Ahn Ji Sook, 7, were brought to the U.S. in November aboard Air Force One, after successful heart surgery the children returned home in time for Christmas.

Todd and Nancy Tilton of Manhasset, New York are the proud parents of the first test tube twins born in the U.S. Heather Jean and Todd MacDonald were born on March 24 at North Shore University Hospital.

Beautiful and talented Vanessa Williams of Syracuse, New York became the first black to win Miss America honors. The 20-year-old Vanessa won the swimsuit and talent competitions.

A birthday was celebrated in Brooklyn this summer. The Brooklyn Bridge turned 100 and fireworks and a U.S. postage stamp helped in the celebration.

The America's Cup went down under for the first time in it's 25 race, 132 year-old existence. Australia II defeated the U.S. Liberty to win yachting's most coveted trophy.

Also in sports, baseball greats, Carl Yastrzemski, of the Boston Red Sox, and Johnny Bench, of the Cincinnati Reds called it quits after playing their entire careers with their respective clubs. On a sad note, Paul "Bear" Bryant, most likely the greatest college football coach of all-time, passed away after retiring from the University of Alabama, where he led the Crimson Tide to four national championships.

The best movies of 1983 included: *Flashdance*, starring Jennifer Beals; the third movie of the Star Wars trilogy, *Return of the Jedi*; Eddie Murphy's *Trading Places*; and two James Bond movies, Roger Moore's *Octopussy* and Sean Connery's return to bondage in *Never Say Never Again*.

Deaths in 1983 were numerous, including; actors David Niven, Raymond Massey, and Pat O'Brien, actress Gloria Swanson, radio-T.V. personality Arthur Godfrey, Cardinal Cooke, sportsmen Jack Dempsey and Joe Delaney, gangster Meyer Lansky, T.V. newscaster Jessica Savitch, and former first mother Lillian Carter.

In Northville, a major storm caused more damage than would be expected from 1.2 inches of rainfall. Nearly half of this fell in only fifteen minutes, flooding streets, which in time drained efficiently. The winds proved most detrimental. Some of the oldest trees in the city were destroyed, had limbs amputated or were simply ripped from the ground, roots and all. Homes and garages were not spared from this fate as many power lines were downed cars crushed and roofs crashed.

The city had budget problems after the legislature in Lansing cut the taxes returned to racetrack cities. Following this setback, the year-end budget deficit was about \$450,000 dollars.

Liquor license debates seemed to dominate the agendas of city council meetings, with one being approved and another turbulantly denied.

The city and township as well as Plymouth, Novi, and Farmington signed to receive ambulance service from Community Emergency Medical Services, dropping agreements with Novi Ambulance.

An uplifting note was the continuation of the downtown renovation project, as business activity and development showed signs of improvement.

Northville Township found it necessary to once again ponder the prison question. Already decided upon, a regional prison at Five Mile and Beck was in danger of being scrapped by the state in favor of a conversion project at the Plymouth Center, which will soon be vacant, and could save some \$20 million dollars. Objections were raised because such a conversion could jeopardize development of a senior citizens complex in the area.

Residents breathed a collective sigh of relief upon the planting of shrubs around the Northville Regional Psychiatric Hospital. Although small, the shrubs when grown should provide a deterrent for patients who wish to leave the grounds without permission.

Meijer Incorporated, parent company of the Meijer's Thrifty Acres discount stores have made a bid to become Northville's largest private employer, if it's plans to build at Haggerty and Eight Mile are approved by the Township planning commission.

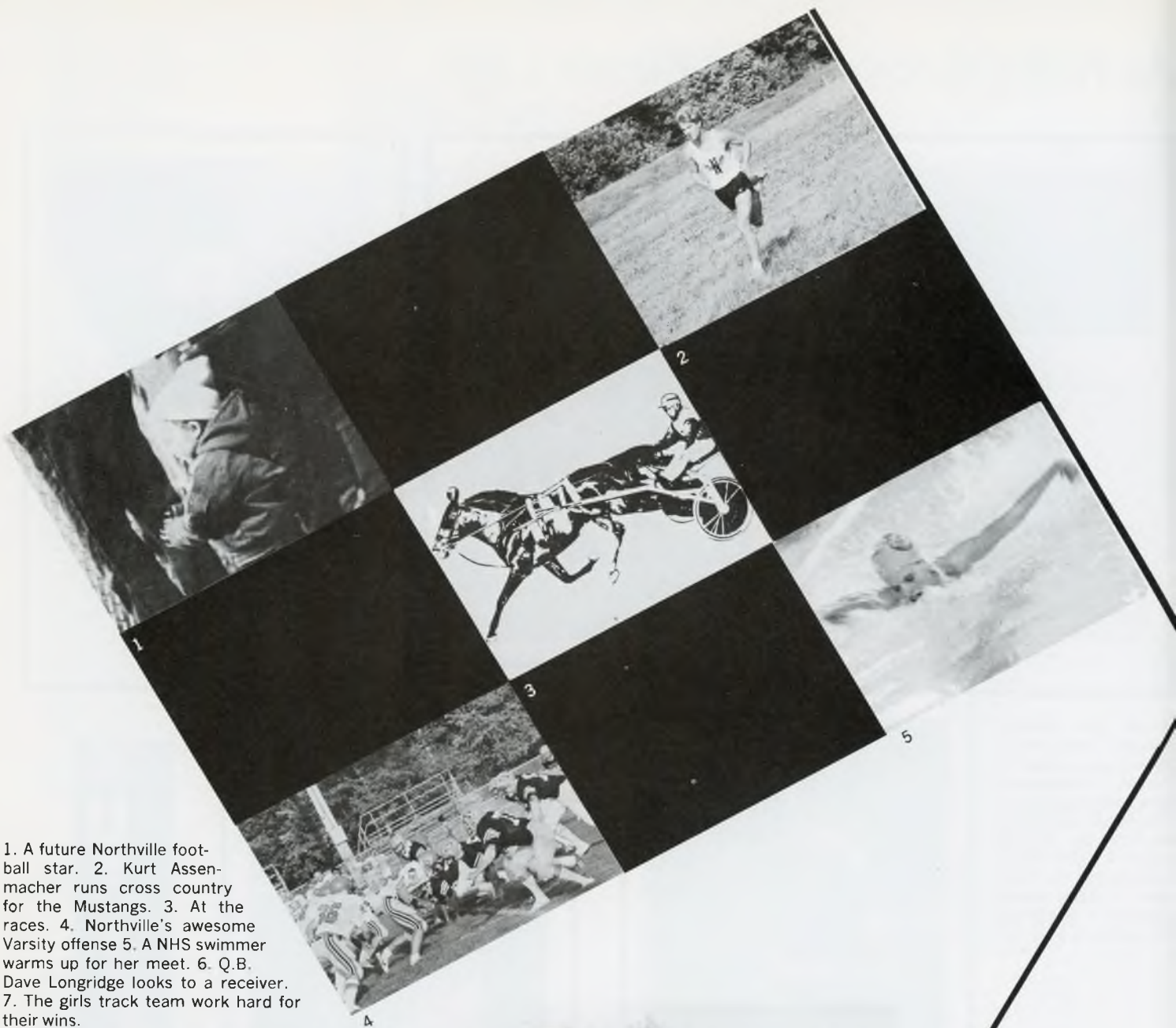

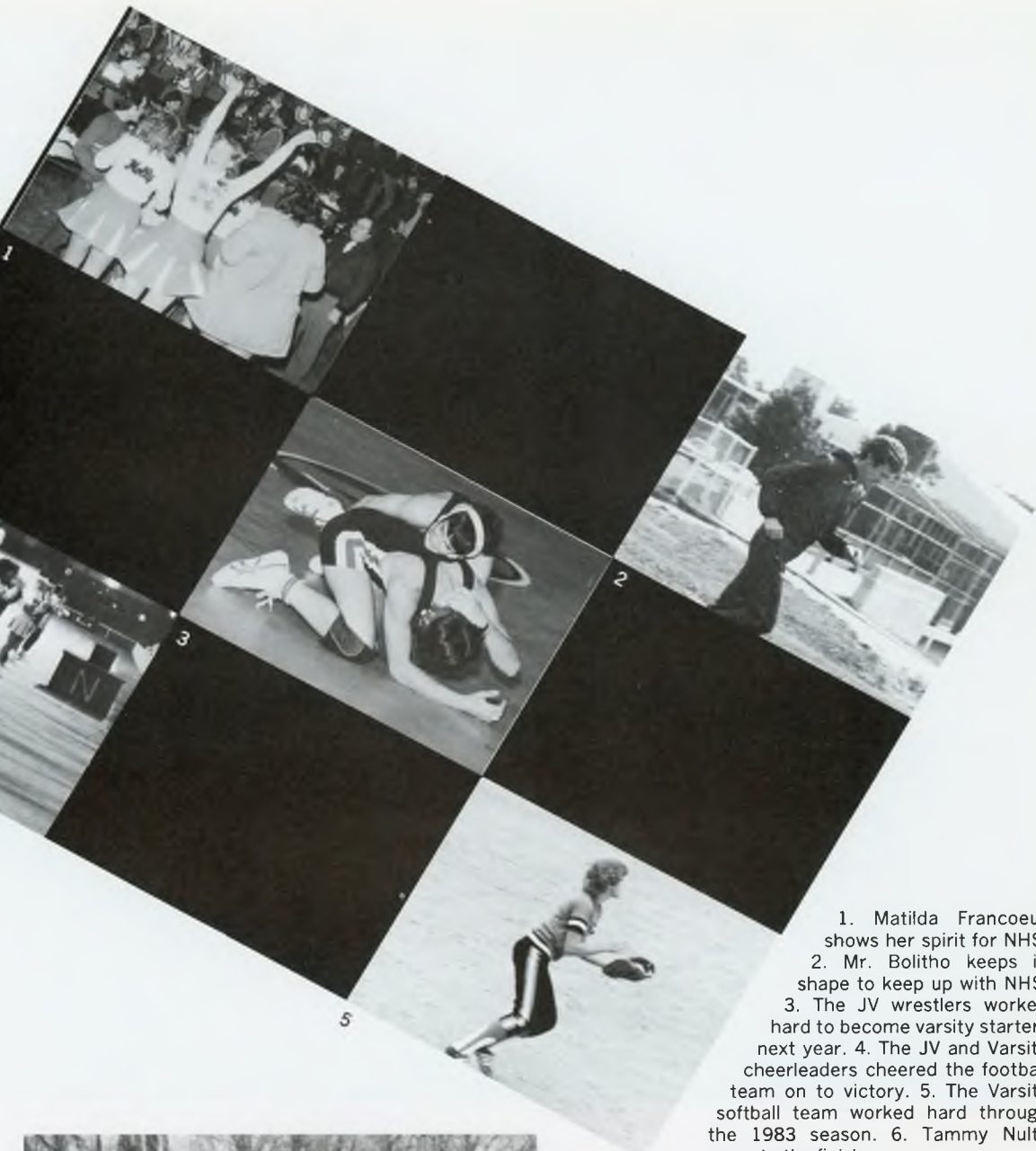

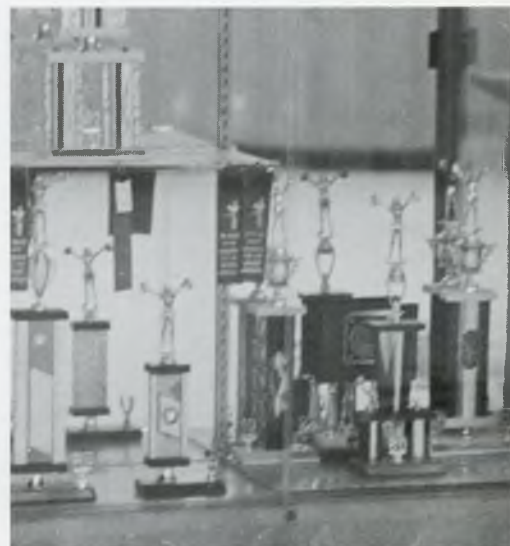


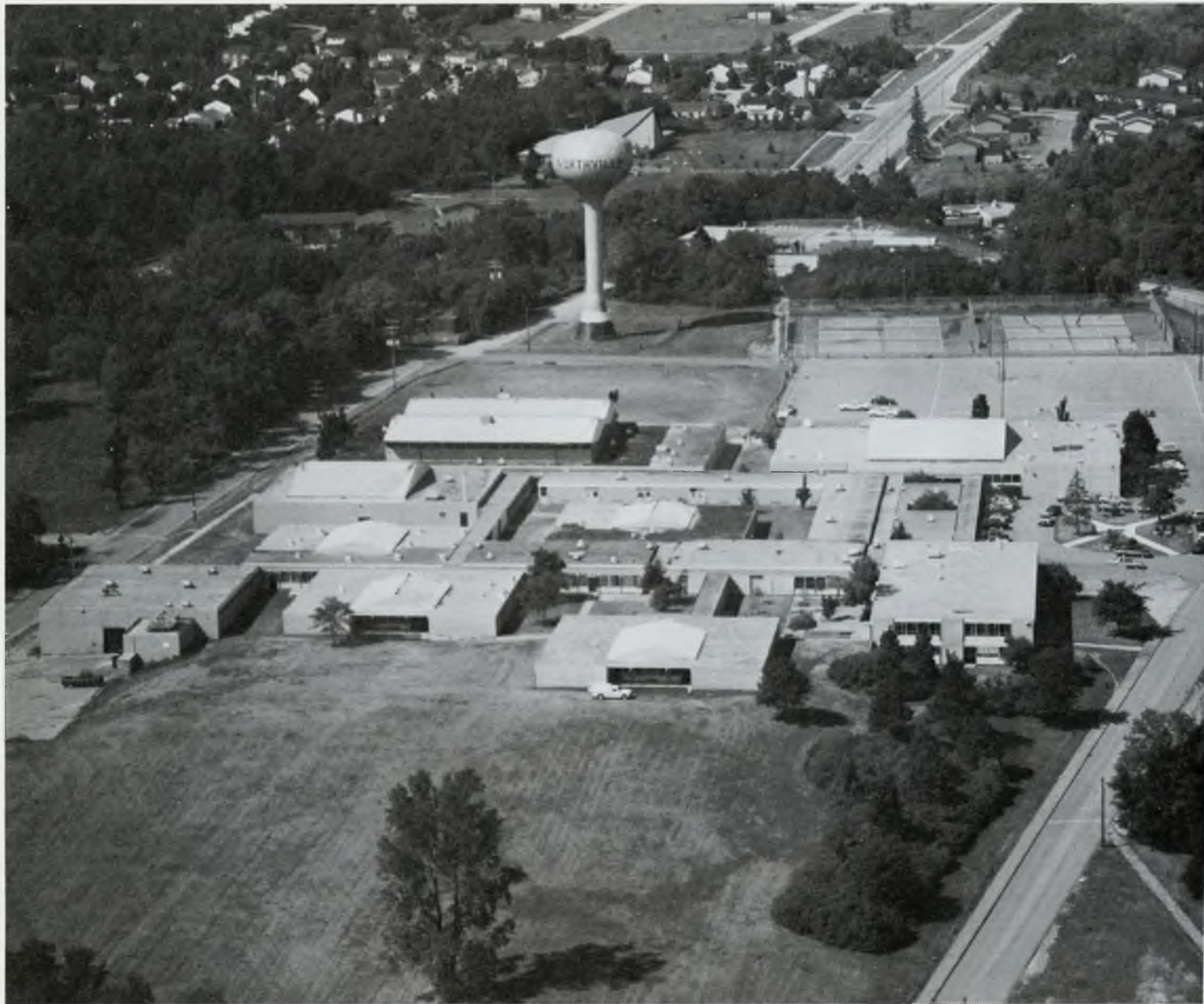
